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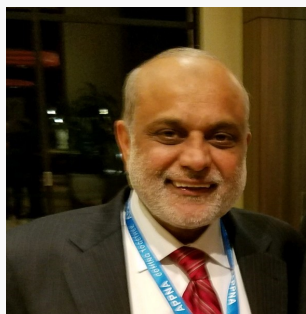

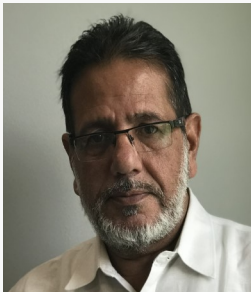

## Healthcare

### Project Updates

**“Umeed Say Aagay”** advocacy campaign in collaboration with the Ministry of Planning Development and Reforms, HDF Pakistan has being elected to the executive council of the SUN Civil Society Alliance (SUNCSA) in Pakistan. Pakistan has been a member of the international SUN Movement since 26 January 2013 and has since established a Nutrition Development Partners Group at the Planning and Development Division in the Prime Minister’s Office to help improve development partner coordination and multi-sectoral platforms at provincial level.

As an Executive Member, HDF Pakistan’s Executive Director Saeed ul Hassan participated in the first meeting of newly elected Executive Council of the SUNCSA chaired by the Pakistan Poverty Alleviation Fund (PPAF). The SUNCSA movement is working to bring people together for a coherent policy and legal framework to align programs around a common results framework with secure financial tracking and resource mobilization.

Saeed Ul Hassan highlighted that “Pakistan is a country where mother and child mortality is hitting alarming levels.” Citing HDF Pakistan figures, he said “over **400,000** mothers and children under the age of five die of preventable causes every year in Pakistan and over **175,000** of these deaths are related to malnutrition.” He stressed that “malnourished children have a higher risk of death from common childhood illness such as diarrhea, pneumonia etc.” Nutrition-related factors contribute to about **45%** of deaths in children under the age of 5 years.

In effort to bring down the child mortality, Human Development Foundation (HDF) launched the “Umeed Say Aagay” initiative to save mothers and children from death. “We can do it. Close to **90%** of the deaths are preventable in Pakistan and this is the driving force for us,” he said. Saeed Ul Hassan has been successful in bringing the government and other stakeholders together to foster a healthy community, where everyone is optimally nourished and where no mother or child dies due to any preventable cause especially malnutrition.



### **Government of Pakistan launches Mass Awareness Campaign on Umeed Say Aagay in all provinces**

**Islamabad, July 23, 2018:** Ministry of Planning, Development & Reform announced here today the launch of Mass Awareness Campaign on HDF’s Umeed Say Aagay initiative of mother/child wellness. This follows the launch of the program last April on national level by SUN Secretariat of the Ministry in collaboration with HDF, which was inaugurated by Mariam Aurangzeb, then Minister of information & broadcasting. More than 150 persons from federal, provincial, AJ&K, Gilgit-Baltistan, and FATA governments, UN Agencies, donors, and development partners including the chairpersons of boards of directors of HDF Pakistan and USA attended that ceremony. The latest launch of the campaign begins on August 3 in Lahore followed by August 17, September 18, and September 25 in Karachi, Peshawar, and Quetta respectively. “This activity is crucial in creating awareness among masses regarding mother child health and nutrition...,” said M. Aslam Shaheen, The ministry’s focal person in a letter. HDF “works to facilitate for positive social change and community empowerment through mass education, enhanced quality of education, universal primary healthcare and grassroots economic development,” he added.

### Pakistan Water Crisis

#### The Impending Doom?

Among the most imminent challenges that Pakistan has faced since its independence, the water crisis has always been at the forefront.

Reports by United Nations Development Program (UNDP) as well as Pakistan Council of Research in Water Resources (PCRWR) have warned that the country will reach absolute water scarcity by the year 2025.

Despite having abundance of water resources, Pakistan has failed to utilize most of them. Whenever the water crisis comes under discussion, the managing and construction of new dams becomes the bone of contention between provinces, and as a result the crisis remains unheeded. Water is desperately needed for agriculture in rural areas and a water crisis is blatantly apparent in urban areas as well. The mega dams of Pakistan such as Tarbela and Mangla are almost 40 years old and have reached their extreme lifespan as the storage capacity of these dams are falling short due to silting and sedimentation. The one reason that lies in the center of the water crisis manifesto is the lack of water reservoirs. According to a research study on water resources of Pakistan, water having economic values of approximately \$70 billion is being thrown into the sea every year due to non-construction of water reservoirs. Pakistan being a water starved country cannot

afford to waste water of such mammoth value.

Water crisis is one such topic that becomes the center of discussion of every government and political campaigns, but eventually erodes, as no solution is agreed upon. There are certain micro level solutions that can help reserve the water for future use. According to the United Nations Development Program (UNDP), the methods of precision land leveling (mechanical process of grading and smoothing the land to a precise and uniform plane surface at grade or no grade) and furrow bed irrigation (type of irrigation in which trenches or furrows are dug between crop rows in fields) has resulted in saving 30 per cent of water and has led to increasing water productivity by 25 per cent in Punjab. Its scope needs to be widened across Pakistan to achieve water availability.

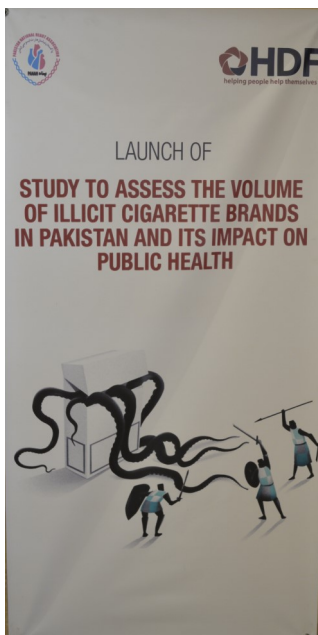
The local authorities should make sure that there is minimum reduction in water losses through outflow, leakage and filtration by lining of canals, distributaries and water channels. Instead of focusing on constructing mega dams for water conservation, local dams should be constructed to facilitate areas that are facing extreme water scarcity.

At the government level, water pricing needs to be executed in the country for improved and efficient use of water.

There are many applicable solutions of the growing water crisis, but unfortunately the water crisis is politicized for personal and political gains. Our unwillingness to treat water as an economic good, and our ignorance regarding the environmental concerns related with current practices have led us towards this disastrous situation. An urgent remedy is needed; otherwise it



#### Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids



Under the CTFK project, HDF aims to advocate for the effective taxation structure to decrease the consumption of tobacco products in Pakistan. It also intends to develop and advocate for the implementation of a comprehensive National Tobacco Plan which includes sustainable tobacco control practices. To deliver on the objectives of the project, HDF has connected with the relevant media houses and has circulated various messages on the need to adjust taxation and price structure of the tobacco related products in Pakistan. The Anti-Tobacco forums on social media have also been created to convince the stakeholders about the adversaries associated with prolonged tobacco consumption. Opinion polls are circulated online to gather input from the general public about possible tobacco control policies in Pakistan. Moreover, HDF arranged a press-conference in collaboration with the other stakeholders to discuss the issues of illicit trade. An informative session was held with the channel Royal TV to discuss the health issues associated with prolonged tobacco consumption. This month, HDF attended a conference where the struggles of the health and development sector in combating the menace of tobacco consumption was discussed. HDF understands that advocacy and awareness raising is essential to press the government for tobacco taxation in the country and would hence continue its efforts towards the same.



#### Should water be a luxury few can afford?

Through the barren desert under the scorching sun, the women can be seen struggling across the hard land, risking injury and forgoing education to survive. These residents of Village Ghandaya, one of many destitute villages of UC Shahabzai in Zhob Region, have to travel 2 km each day to fetch water for their families. Whilst mostly dependent on livestock and agriculture for their livelihoods, the 56 families also face low levels of education as they endeavor to fulfill their dire need of water.

To improve their living situation, a Community Physical Infrastructure (CPI) scheme for the provision of a drinking water source was proposed by HDF. Under the financial support of Programme for Poverty Reduction by HDF-PPAF, monitoring by LSO Shahabzai and implementation by Village Development Organization (VDO) Ghandaya, the first ever Drinking Water Supply Scheme (DWSS) in the village was successfully completed, greatly easing the lives of the residents, especially women and girls. The DWSS includes a developed water source with storage capacity.

An elder in Village Ghandaya stated: *"We are very happy and thankful to HDF for this scheme which is a big step towards a quality life for us."*

Following the development of a water source, the girls have been able to focus on what mattered most; Education. They have been enrolled in an En-

terprise Girls School which provides primary level education and is supported by HDF-PPAF, allowing the CPI to positively affect female education, health and livelihoods of the area.

*"I used to have the duty to bring water from far off areas with other girls. My wish was to get an education but I could not. Now because of this scheme I am free to get education. Thanks to HDF."*-Razia Bibi

With the looming water crisis, HDF has doubled its efforts to provide safe drinking water to vulnerable communities. Since 2005, the proportion of population with sustainable access to an improved water source, both urban and rural, has increased to 96% from 56% in HDF program areas. We have effectively provided clean drinking water with over 200 CPI projects in Zhob Region alone.



#### Solar Water Pumps

Tharparkar Sindh

People of Thar Desert have been grappling with the issue of inadequate safe drinking water for themselves and their livestock for the last many decades. The villagers, mostly children and women, faced a difficult practice of dragging out water from a depth of more than 150 feet. This difficulty compelled inhabitants to use less water, resulting in health and hygiene issues.

HDF proposed to provide safe drinking water through alternative energy in order to improve health and hygiene in Villages Katho Samo and Katho Bheel in district Tharparkar. The project involves two solar powered submersible water pumps benefiting over 1000 people in over 150 households. More than 800 animals are also benefiting from this facility.

The improved water and sanitation services in the two communities has improved health and hygiene of the people. By providing safe drinking water and raising awareness among them on the importance of health and hygiene, absenteeism and drop-out ratio has been reduced among school going children, while also reducing the risk of miscarriage for pregnant women, and allowing them to focus on important tasks for running their households.



#### Street Children Project in RYK

In 2017, the Labor and Human Resource Department in Punjab started a welfare project called *"Elimination of Child and Bonded Labor"* which enrolls children in schools who work at auto workshops, hotels and brick kilns. These children are under 16 years of age and used as labor which constitutes a criminal act. To tackle this issue, HDF regional team in Rahim Yar Khan collaborated with the Labor and Human Resource Department. The Government of Punjab has declared a stipend of PKR 550 for each student enrolled in the school or established center for study. Apart from providing a stipend to cover the operational cost of the center, the Government of Punjab provides curriculum based books for each student. As the implementing partner, HDF's regional office in Rahim Yar Khan deals with the operational part of the project, including identifying and enrolling the underage children.



Currently, HDF is running a center with 15 such children in a room in its regional office building. We aim to establish more centers and provide a way out to these oppressed children through education.



#### HR Learning & Development Centre (HRLDC)



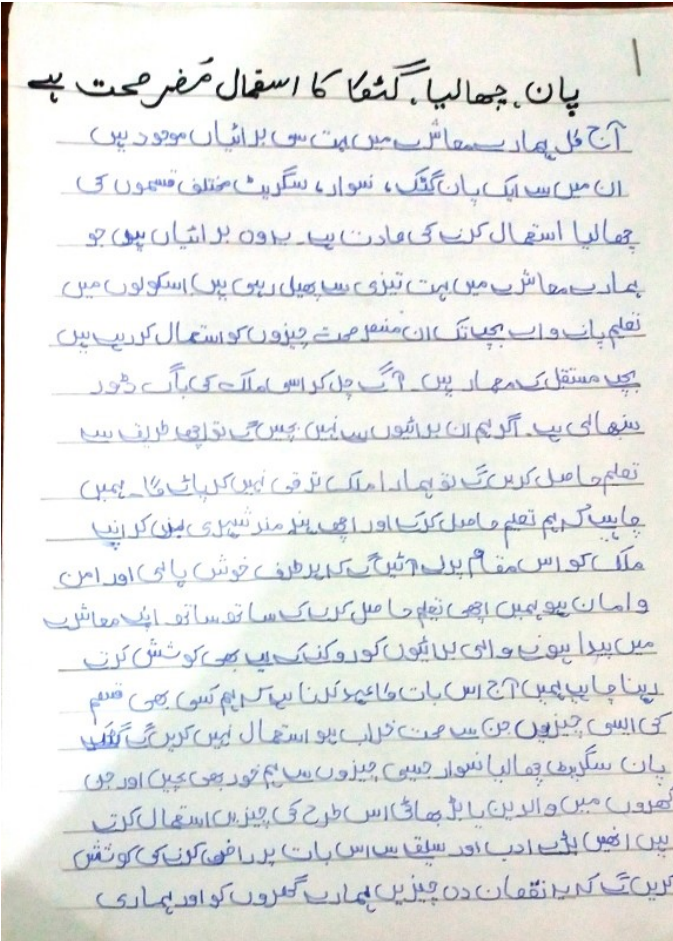

HDF developed its first social enterprise in the form of a technical and vocational training institute. Under the Economic Development section, the first ever institution by HDF in Samar Bagh, Mardan, Human Resource Learning and Development Centre (HRLDC), was established.

HRLDC began its operations in January 2018. Two batches of students have successfully completed training in the field of Office Automation and Building Electrician. Now, the institution is ready to add more batches of 25 students each.

In a very short span of time, the institution has been recognized by the Skill Development Council (SDC), allowing HRLDC to give its own certificates which will hold recognition in the job market. This creates better employment opportunities for these students, enabling them to break free from the vicious cycle of poverty.

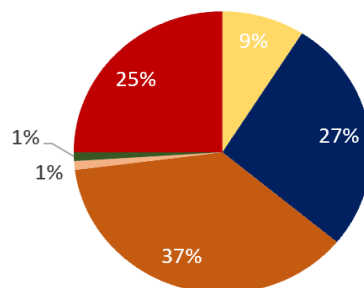
2018 Budgeted \$ vs YTD Recieved \$

## Social Mobilization

### Village Development Organization (VDO)

#### Leading Their Own Progress

Village Shahi Bagh was considered one of many villages in Mardan where development was restricted. A disorganized village platform with residents divided on village issues created a barrier to progress. The poverty ridden people were barely able to cover their own needs let alone work for the welfare of their community.

HDF succeeded in organizing the divided village under the umbrella of a Village Development Organization (VDO). The members were trained and facilitated to prepare a plan for village development. They prioritized problems and identified actors through whom these problems could be solved. The VDO started to create linkages with government and NGOs to solve these problems, such as those of education and high mortality from diseases.

By eliminating misperceptions of parents through awareness campaigns, the VDO encourages them to enroll their children in schools for a better future. The members have also succeeded in approving a government primary school for girls in the village due to which the education rate rose from 60% to 95%. A free tuition center for children has also been established to improve their academic understanding.

To set up their own business, skills trainings are being provided to men and women through various organizations leading to beneficiaries securing earnings and ultimately resulting in poverty reduction. To ensure environmental sustainability, a committee has been formed at village level which has made responsible for monthly cleaning drives. Streets and roads have been paved through help from government and other NGOs. The VDO also carries out sanitation and hygiene awareness campaigns which has reduced 60% of waterborne diseases in the village. Joint efforts to ensure vaccination have helped to increase immunization from 65% to 95% under the Extended Program of Immunization (EPI).

HDF has established over 1600 Development Organizations across eight regions of Pakistan. These grassroots institutions have been working to enable communities to develop their own future.

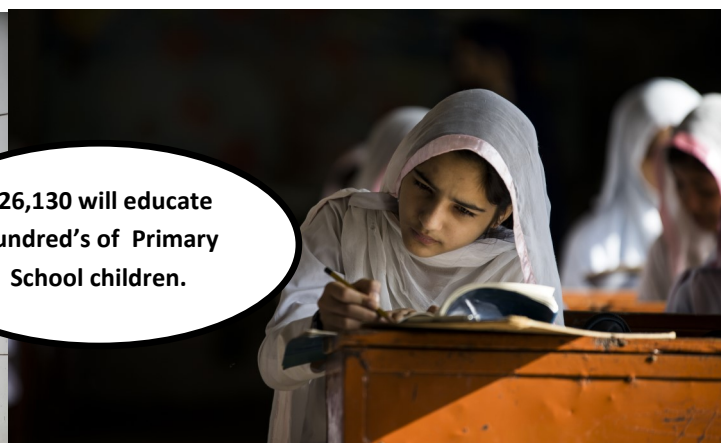
